


Jana Bauer

is a bestselling children's author. Her writing features a blend of witty, amusing characters coupled with compelling stories. Although her books are meant for children, their magic and originality give great pleasure to readers of all generations. Her first work, *The Witch Vanisher*, was nominated for the Večernica Award (2003). However, she gained by far the greatest popularity with *Scary Fairy in Wicked Wood* (2011), which has so far been translated into 18 languages. In 2020, Jana Bauer received the Desetnica Award from the Slovene Writers' Association for her *Ding Dong Stories*. For the picture book *How to Hug a Hedgehog*, she received the 2022 Kristina Brenk Award for the best original Slovenian picture book.

Ana Košir

was born in 1970 in Ljubljana, Slovenia. During her studies at the Academy of Fine Arts in Ljubljana, she started working on illustration, and after graduation, she pursued it professionally. She has illustrated a variety of books for children and young adults and collaborated with numerous Slovenian writers for both young and adult audiences. She has received the My Favorite Book Award five times for her illustrations in the *Anica* book series and has also written and illustrated an original picture book about astronomy.


Selling points:



Little Curly Stories

When Slavko Pregl breathes life into everyday objects, they appear before the reader in sharp, playful, and witty scenes. The character's opinions clash in pointed dialogues, revealing a whole range of human traits, from arrogance, bluntness, and mockery to humour and wisdom. In Pregl's narrative world, we meet the lowercase "o" that observes fairy tales and the behavior of uppercase letters; the boredom that can't be bothered to move from the couch; and the light bulb that comments on the actions of objects nearby. We also listen to the dialogue between a camel and a fish in the desert.

Little Curly Stories are witty, playful and, at times, teasing. Slavko Pregl and Damijan Stepančič have combined their stories and illustrations with great skill. Now we can enjoy and explore the world from a different perspective, turning our expectations upside down along the way. Just don't forget your hairbrush!


Slavko Pregl

is an author for young adults, storyteller, fable writer, publisher, and editor. He has published more than 50 books, primarily works for children and young adults, which have been translated into numerous languages. He has received several major national awards, including the Levstik Award, Večernica Award, Desetnica Award, and Župančič Award. His works have been published in numerous anthologies and have been the subject of academic discussions. He was the President of the Slovene Writers' Association, the President of the Reading Badge Association, and the President of the Slovenian Publishers' Association, as well as the first director of the Public Agency for Books of the Republic of Slovenia.

Damijan Stepančič

graduated from the Academy of Fine Arts in Ljubljana. Soon after completing his studies in painting, his attention was drawn to illustration as it offers more possibilities for the exploration of different media. He has so far illustrated almost a hundred books, co-created many comic books, and had several independent exhibitions in the field of illustration. He has also illustrated around a hundred textbooks, exercise books, handbooks for teachers, and other educational material, as well as more than 120 articles in children's magazines. He has received a number of Slovenian and international awards for his illustrations.

Despite the considerable difficulty of studying Stone-Eaters and their habits, a diligent and dedicated team of experts has managed to collect enough credible data over more than fifty years to publish this book. Aksinja Kermauner

is a professor of Slovenian language and visual arts, a tiflopedagogue, writer and poet. In her works, she draws attention to the challenges faced by blind, visually impaired, and deaf individuals. She wrote the first Slovenian tactile book for visually impaired children, which was chosen as an outstanding achievement at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. So far, she has published 39 fiction books for children, young adults, and adults, along with numerous articles and three monographs in the field of individuals with special needs.

Janja Plazar

has a PhD in biology and is a lecturer at the Faculty of Education, University of Primorska. Her scientific work focuses on the field of science education, as well as on teaching science to blind and visually impaired students. The book on microorganisms titled *The Secret World of Tiny Creatures*, which she co-authored with writer Dima Zupan, received recognition for excellence as an original Slovenian youth educational book. Together with Aksinja Kermauner, she created *With Fingertips to the Stars*, the first tactile book about the universe.

Galina Miklínová

is a Czech illustrator and animated film director. She is the author of the popular animated series *O Kanafáskovi* and five original short films. In collaboration with writer Pavel Šrut, she brought to life the *Lichožrouti* trilogy, receiving awards such as the Magnesia Litera 2009, Most Beautiful Book of the Year 2009, and the Magnesia Litera Book of the Decade. She has illustrated over 30 books for children.







My Neighbour Up There is a collection of quirky, happy, loving and cheeky short stories from a world where granny climbs into grandad's heart, where Mr Antonelo's elbow gets stuck in a house, while his neighbour Dodič is lifted to the ceiling by love. There is also a tiny man in a cup of coffee, demanding Mr Kravos's sugar, a fat baker, who secretly climbs into doughnuts at her bakery in order to lick the jam, and the narrowest street in which only very thin people live. The stories, full of verbal humour and nonsense, are unputdownable, and the lively wit has been colourfully enriched by the award-winning illustrator Peter Škerl.



And the Dragon Ate the Sun

In her skillfully crafted travelogue novel, Aksinja Kermauner doesn't just provide teenage readers with a literary window into another land; she also explores the uniqueness and struggles of the main characters. Their challenges become even more profound when faced in a foreign setting, and through their emotional experiences, they evaluate the complexity of China – a land that embodies wisdom and madness, kindness and despair, modernity, and a millennia-old culture.

The author, who has devoted decades to working with blind and visually impaired youth, places Sunčan, a nearly completely blind protagonist grappling with identity trauma, at the center of the narrative. *And the Dragon Ate the Sun* is not just an original travelogue across China but one of the most nuanced accounts of blindness, serving as a valuable guide for sighted readers.

The poignant narrative by Aksinja Kermauner masterfully combines the experiences of a blind first-person narrator with the voices of other students in unusual circumstances during their excursion to China, along with academically

sound reports on the history of this distant and little-known culture. Any reader of this book will struggle to put it down before they reach the end

is a professor of Slovenian language and visual arts, a tiflopedagogue, writer and poet. For 25 years, she taught Slovenian language and visual arts and worked as a tiflomobile pedagogue at the Institute for the Blind and Visually Impaired Youth in Ljubljana. In 2010, she earned her doctorate in the Department of Special and Rehabilitation Pedagogy at the Faculty of Education in Ljubljana. Until 2022, she lectured at the Department of Inclusive Pedagogy at the Faculty of Education, University of Primorska. She wrote the first Slovenian tactile book for visually impaired children, which was chosen as an outstanding achievement at the Bologna Children's Book Fair. So far, she has published 39 fiction books for children, young adults, and adults, along with numerous articles and three monographs in the field of individuals with special needs.





Soul Merchant

Now in his later years, Evald Flisar, the author of this unusual novel, embarks on a journey following the traces of his past travels. He wants to discover how much the world has changed in four decades, and how much his own "self", which is becoming increasingly alien to him, has become different. He accidentally finds himself on Simba, a small island in the eastern part of Indonesia, where he encounters unusual people and strange events. The island, where the inhabitants cling to spirituality and ancient customs, has become a victim of an American merchant named Wilson, who exports life-sized carved elephants made of teak wood, while importing gadgets that will help him "modernize" the island and colonise it. The tense and humorous narrative, intertwining extraordinary events with profound insights, ultimately turns into a tragedy. Simba warns us about human greed, which relentlessly pushes the world towards ruin.

However, the author, who has 253 translations in 41 languages (which means that his works can be read by half of the world's population), is interested in something else. To what extent does what we experience and what we imagine eventually merge into a mixture of both, where we can no longer determine what is true and what is imagined? To what extent is what we perceive as memories of past events, fiction? To what extent are we not much more than characters in a story that we ourselves create with interpretations of the events that befall us and the actions we choose in life?

Evald Flisar

is a multi-award-winning Slovenian author and internationally performed playwright. His works have been translated into 41 languages, with 253 translations so far. Flisar has won the Prešeren Foundation Prize, the highest state award for prose and drama, the Župančič Award for lifetime achievement, three awards for Best Play of the Year and, in addition, 18 nominations for other literary awards.







Tone Hočevar

is a legend of Slovene journalism, a television presenter and even a cameraman when necessary, documentary-maker, editor, and the former editor of a pool of press agencies from non-aligned countries. He began working as a journalist in the early 1970s at TV Slovenia, for many years he worked as a correspondent from Latin America and the Caribbean, where he wrote the book *Volcanoes Do Not Die.* Between 1987 and 1992, he presented and edited Slovenia's main evening news programme, where he was one of the presenters during the country's war of independence. He also worked as a journalist at the television foreign policy editorial office. Tone left television in order to be the Foreign Policy Editor of the newly founded newspaper Republika and after it ceased publication he took on that job at the newspaper Delo. In 1996 he started working as Delo's correspondent from Rome, publishing in 2011 *Rome: Eternal and Holy, Transient and Secular.*

The Hairy Bunch

Once again Tone Hočevar comes through as a brilliant storyteller: he intertwined the stories of dog heroes – including a rescue dog, a therapy dog, a dog who learned to give warning when it was necessary to act in diabetes, and even a movie star dog – with memories of his childhood and of his living around the world. "It's much, truly much to their credit that in many places I'd got hold of behind-the-scenes insights and truths that otherwise I would not have known. In Mexico, in Cuba, and in Italy," writes Hočevar. Everywhere where he was stationed, he and his family were accompanied by – pups. Come to know the mischievous, the sharp, the hunting, and the cuddly little dogs that enriched the life of Hočevars, or even saved it at times. Three four-legged family members lay at his feet when he was writing the book just like they did during his journalist career.


I can say without hesitation that there has never been a book like Hočevar's *The Hairy Bunch*, and not just in Slovenia. (...) *The Hairy Bunch* is a remarkable book. Finely written, without any airs or the writer's showing off his knowledge, experience, or importance, with just the right balance of the popular and the scientific, the funny and the tragic, the canine and the human, the domestic and the foreign, of personal memories and of

other people's stories. However, it is vital and precious that in addition to dogs, Tone Hočevar loves people, that he loves approaching them and keeping them company and that despite all his cosmopolitanism, he's remained a simple boy from the rural Koseze. "The world would have been void without mongrels," he wrote. It would also be void and dull without people like Tone Hočevar.
